Lovestruck Balladeers Perform at the Academy



The Lovestruck Balladeers will perform a program of old-time jazz, swing, country, waltzes, ragtime and more at the Academy on Friday, May 31 at 8pm.

"The Lovestruck Balladeers are incredible musicians with an eclectic repertoire," says Wayne Greene, member of the Academy Music Committee. "It's going to be a fun night of toe-tapping music that will keep you smiling."

Born out of New York's vibrant classic jazz and traditional music scene, the Lovestruck Balladeers formed during a series of recording sessions for Jalopy Records' 2018 release, *Estrellas de Radio*. Since their debut at the Brooklyn Folk Festival that year, the versatile quintet has made a name for itself as a compelling new act highlighting musical excellence, fresh arrangements, original songs and a tightly crafted stage show. Together or on their own paths, this stellar band of traveling musicians has traversed the country and the globe, carrying traditional styles into modern times.

The concert is part of the Academy's **Roots & Shoots** series, which showcases artists who reach back to earlier traditions in music for inspiration while incorporating more recent forms and influences. WEEDING OUT FACT FROM FICTION

A popular series examines the uses of medical cannabis

A leading advocate for the uses of medical marijuana will discuss the fascinating history of cannabis, his personal perspective about the plant, and the results he's seen for his patients and their families at the Academy on Sunday, June 9 at 3pm. The event is part of the Academy's Conversations with Neighbors series.

The speaker, Dr. Kenneth R. Weinberg, is the founder and chief medical officer of Cannabis Doctors of New York. "Dr. Weinberg has followed his own path, and heart, through his career, looking for solutions for his patients that embrace body and soul," says Lisa Bouchard Hoe, who co-chairs the series with Cindy Atkins. "With his study and use of cannabis as an alternative for Alzheimer's and other maladies of aging, he is a groundbreaker."



Dr. Weinberg is a three-time Board-certified emergency medicine and medical marijuana physician. He has practiced emergency and urgent care medicine for over three decades and treated hundreds of patients with diseases across a spectrum of conditions. When New York State's Compassionate Care Act was passed in 2016, he founded Cannabis Doctors of New York.

The practice, which is based in New York City and upstate New York, certifies patients, educates the public, and advocates for the many benefits of medical marijuana.

themes of identity, memory and remembrance, joy, nature and spirituality."

The artists in the show work in a variety of forms, styles and media and include Kim Bach, Mary Breneman, Peter Hoffman, Gretchen Kelly, Joe Mama-Nitzberg, Linda McNutt, Christine Mottau, Robin Rice, Marc Swanson and Anya Ulinich.

The show opens with a reception on Saturday, June 1, 4-6pm and continues through the month on Saturdays and Sundays from 1-5pm.

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
At the Academy, the tunes keep coming

A WALK IN THE WOODS A writing workshop draws inspiration from nature

Summer is near—a perfect time for **Nature Writing: Poetry and Prose Workshop** with Donna Kaz on Saturday, June 15, 10am-3pm. Tuition is \$30 for Academy members and \$35 for non-members. Register at spencertownacademy.org.

Participants will explore the unique landscape of summer and be guided through examples of how poets like Mary Oliver and Robert Frost have used their environment to inspire their writing styles. The class will take a stroll through a nearby Columbia Land Conservancy site and return to the Academy for lunch (BYO) and writing exercises.



"Nature is full of inspiration and can easily serve as a muse for writers," says Donna, director of the Academy's All Write, Columbia Writers Conference, activist, and author of "The Sweetgum Trilogy," a cycle of plays that explores the invisible thread between humans and the natural world. "Bring paper and pen and leave with a short journal entry, prose piece, or poem about how you connect to the landscape around you. No writing experience necessary—only a love of reading and writing about the beauty and wonder of nature."

theme. You must take chances, knowing that individual perspectives are an integral part of creativity."





TOO MANY BOOKS, TOO LITTLE SPACE?

Donate your extras to the Festival of Books

The summer equinox is a few weeks away, but it's not too early to be looking ahead to the Academy's signature end-of-summer event—the 19th annual Festival of Books, which begins on Friday, August 30, and runs through Labor Day weekend.

As always, the Festival will feature an exciting roster of panel discussions, readings and children's programs. Participating authors Ruth Reichl, Andrew Leland, Martin Baron, Anna Shechtman, Stephen McCauley and Paul Muldoon.

The Festival offers a chance to do some serious browsing and buying. But if your shelves are already buckling under the weight of too many books, you can offload your extras to the Festival.



While gently used items are welcome, the Festival will pass on books that are damaged, soiled, damp, mildewed or heavily marked up as well as textbooks, magazines, pre-2023 travel guides, uncorrected proofs or galleys, library books and VHS tapes.

If you're donating higher-value items, such as autographed or rare books, keep them separate and consider wrapping them in plastic sleeves.

"Labeling them with post-it notes also helps," says co-chair Wayne Greene.

Donations will be accepted at the Academy starting July 13. Details will be emailed and posted on spencertownacademy.org closer to the date.
